The Name Game

Equipment needed: A soft plastic stick or Styrofoam noodle (1.5 ft. in length)

The Name Game is an interactive game that involves fast speaking, memorization, and speed.

To start the game, all the participants must form a circle. There will be one person in the middle of the circle holding the stick or noodle. After the circle is formed, the group can decide on what they want the theme for the game to be. If the group members are not familiar with each other's names, the theme should be names.

Each participant in the circle, including the person in the middle of the circle, will say his/her name for everyone to hear. The person in the middle will be the first to call on someone in the circle. That person must now call on someone else in the circle. If the person in the middle hits the "called person" before he/she says someone else's name, that person is now in the middle of the circle, replacing the last hitter, and the last hitter finds a place in the circle. Another great theme, once names are known, is to have everyone name a country or a favorite candy! It is sure to get your participants off of their feet!
